*EXTERNSHIP

One required externship for academic credit (unpaid, per ABA Rules) may be fulfilled in one of two ways:

- 1. **Becoming a Lawyer** (2 cr.), (classroom component of externship requirement) must be taken concurrently with **Legal Externship**:
 - 2 credit hours = 120 hours at placement, or
 - 3 credit hours = 180 hours at placement

Our location in Washington, D.C. offers students the opportunity to choose from a broad spectrum of placements found in federal government agencies, international NGOs, public interest organizations, associations, and major U.S. and international law

firms; the externship must have an international component and the placement must be approved by Director.

In addition to registering in *Becoming a Lawyer* and *Legal Externship* courses, students interested in pursuing a legal externship for academic credit should review the handbook on the <u>Legal Externship Program</u>;

2. **CCLS: Immigration and Refugee Advocacy Clinic** (3-6 crs.) Students who choose to participate in this clinical externship option must enroll in the clinic for a full year.

A grade of B- or better is required for a course to be counted toward the certificate requirement.
